Demystifying Model Railways...

Well, this is a start anyway; do ask questions! Here are some notes on what you will see (mainly for those not already into modelling!):

Types of Railway

This show is all about narrow gauge, industrial and light railways, as distinct from the national main line railway network.

Narrow gauge railways have a smaller distance between the rails (track gauge) and usually smaller trains than the main line, both in size and length. They come in many varieties to serve specific purposes, usually in a small local area.

Industrial railways may be narrow gauge but are often of standard gauge, the same as main line railways, allowing wagons to run from one line to the other. As the name suggests, they serve particular industries such as a mine, steelworks or brewery, often connecting with the main line to exchange loads.

Finally light railways are built and operated to simpler standards to keep costs down. They would generally serve multiple functions, carrying both passengers and goods in a local area and would also usually connect with the main line.

Basics of Modelling

Many different styles of model railway are on display today. Do ask questions of the exhibitors if you want to understand more about what they are showing. Two main things to think about:

• <u>Scale</u>: The size of the trains compared to real life. The most common scale for model railways in the UK is 1:76 (4mm to the foot), known as OO scale, so the model is 76 times smaller than the real thing. Other common scales used are O scale (1:43, 7mm/foot) and N scale (1:148, 2mm/foot).

• <u>Gauge</u>: This is the distance between the two rails. The standard gauge in the UK, the gauge you see when travelling by train, is 1435mm (4ft 8¹/₂in). In OO scale this is modelled at 16.5mm. The equivalents for standard gauge O scale and N scale are 32mm and 9mm respectively. Narrow gauge railways are reduced from these appropriately.

A wide range of both scale and gauge are on display today and details are listed below against each layout.

Electrics and Control

Most model railways run on low voltage electricity, although batteries and live steam are also used. Traditionally, control varied the voltage to the track to make the trains speed up or slow down. The track was divided into sections so that only the train under control moved. More recently, Digital Command Control has been used. This allows control of the each train directly and also allow realistic sound as well.

Construction

There are three main ways of constructing model railways. You can use proprietary equipment bought ready-to-run. Alternatively you can make your own trains, track, buildings, scenery etc using kits or built from scratch, both using many different materials. Most of what is on show today has been made using a mixture of these two, most using proprietary mechanisms.

3. Little Bognor (Philip Pilcher)

[Modelled in O-16.5: 1:43.5 scale and 16.5mm track representing 2ft 4in (~720mm) narrow gauge]

Built by the late Ernie House, this layout is now in the care of the South Downs Group. We show the layout here in his memory. It represents an imaginary line serving a small village near Fittleworth.

4. Chestnut Tree House Hospice

Publicity about the work of this hospice, supported by this show, and a tombola.

5. Andy Lynch Railways

Andy once again brings a range of 'pre-loved' railway items to SWING. Check out what he has on offer, you might just find that particular item you have been searching for.

6. South Downs Group sales and information boards

Second-hand bargains here, and information about the Group and its activities.

7. Anything Narrow Gauge/Simon's Trains

New & second-hand models in OO, N and OO-9, plus a range of 16mm live steam items for sale.

8. Canada Street (Peter Johnson)

[Modelled in EM: 1:76 scale and 18.2mm track representing standard gauge 1435mm (4ft $8\frac{1}{2}$ in)]

The layout portrays a generic British dock in the 60s and 70s, with buildings based on prototypes from different dockside locations including lpswich, Gloucester and Liverpool. Short mixed freight trains arrive in the exchange sidings behind the dock wall from the nearby marshalling yard. The shunting engine stabled in the sidings then takes wagons around the sharp curve of the dock branch. Return 'trip' trains emerge from amongst the dockside mills, before being shunted for the onward journey.

9. Rainbows Rock (Charlie Fox Wilson)

[Modelled in Gn15: 1:22.5 scale and 16.5mm track gauge representing 15in (381mm) narrow gauge]

Charlie Fox Wilson returns to our show with his most colourful and imaginative layout to date. A nod to the works of Rowland Emett brings a touch of whimsy to this layout which will delight the young and young at heart.

10. Harrison Brown

Adrian and team return to SWING with an extensive range of modelling goods, kits, scenic items, figures from Masterpiece Miniatures, DVDs and so much more.

II. K Street Yard (Eric Cains/Carshalton & Sutton Model Railway Club)

[Modelled in HO: 1:87 scale and 16.5mm track representing standard gauge 1435mm (4ft $8\frac{1}{2}$ in)]

An American shunting yard on the Milwaukee Road, set between the late 50s and early 70s.

12. Architectural Models (Mike Tucker)



13. Norge (Mike & Jenny Carter)

[Modelled in HO: 1:87 scale and 16.5mm track representing standard gauge 1435mm (4ft 8¹/₂in)]

Inspired by Norway, Norge is a fictitious seaport with a busy local fishing industry. Look for some of the well-observed details, such as the lady cycling around the town. Featured in Continental Modeller magazine Sep 2019 and Mar, May & Jun 2020.



14. Shellsea Harbour (Giles Barnabe)

[Modelled in OO: 1:76 scale and 16.5mm track representing standard gauge 1435mm (4ft 8¹/₂in)]

At one time there were a number of small privately-operated railways in the UK; the fictitious Shellsea Tramway is one of them. The line runs from the ex-LBSCR station at Shellsea, on the Brighton-Portsmouth route, to serve the local harbour where there is a ferry to Fayling Island, a popular holiday destination. The period shown is the mid-1920s with buildings from Georgian and Victorian times. In this parallel reality Shellsea takes the place of Emsworth, which has provided most of the backscene images.

15. The Lynton and Barnstaple Railway Trust

Souvenirs, information and publications from the Lynton & Barnstaple Railway. The much-loved railway in Devon closed back in in 1936 and the preservation group has operated a short part of the original route from Woody Bay station since 2004, now with replica locos and coaches.

Between 15 and 16, don't forget to stop off at Buffers Bistro!

16. Launceston Steam Railway (Richard Holder)

[Modelled in OO-9: 1:76 scale and 9mm track representing $ft11\frac{1}{2}$ (597mm) narrow gauge]

This is a depiction of the narrow gauge Launceston Steam Railway, which runs on a former mainline route, from Launceston in Cornwall. It was awarded the David Glascott Trophy for the 'Best Narrow Gauge Layout' at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition in 2017.

I7. Bunkers Lane (Bill Flude)

[Modelled in O-9: 1:43.5 scale and 16.5mm track representing 18in (460mm) narrow gauge]

Inspired by the Leighton Buzzard Light Railway, born out of a line serving sand workings, now amongst housing. The model is of a fictitious 18in gauge line, built to the west of the main line, the destination for loaded sand trains. The layout is set in the mid 1980s as the preservation society, formed in the late 60s, had shared the line with the sand companies, but by 1982 sand was only transported by road.

18. Waalhaven (lan Driver)

[Modelled in HO: 1:87 scale and 16.5mm track representing standard gauge 1435mm (4ft $8\frac{1}{2}$ in)]

'Waalhaven' (pronounced Vall hafen) depicts a Strukton Rail depot (a Dutch rail infrastructure construction and maintenance company), in the Rotterdam Europoort where much of the materiel required is brought in by barge or by rail for redistribution on works trains to wherever they are needed on the main line network. Facilities at the yard include various sheds and waterside warehouses where dry materials are stored, as well as a container maintenance area. The layout is set at the turn of the century as the Dutch Railways started to open up to private operators.

19. Scenic display and tree construction demonstration (Roy Hickman)

We are delighted that Roy can be with us once again with his exquisite model scenes backed with such detail. A true craftsman and artist. Once again, he will be offering the chance to get hands on with how to make miniature trees and bushes.

20. 7mm Narrow Gauge Association - Modelling Goods

Pick up useful materials and other items for modelling, particularly in 7mm narrow gauge. Many items suit modelling in any scale. Friendly advice on getting started in 7mm NG modelling is available here from the knowledgeable team.

21. 7mm Narrow Gauge Association - Publicity and Publications

Pick up a bargain or two from the Association's own specially-produced modelling publications. Find out more about modelling narrow-gauge railways in 7mm scale. Members will be happy to answer modelling and prototype questions.

22. Gweithdy Dyffryn (Derek Harris)

[Modelled in O-14: 1:43.5 scale and 14mm track representing 2ft (610mm) narrow gauge]

A micro layout featuring the Welsh slate industry. This was Derek's first model railway layout and was instigated by pictures in a book on slate quarries and particularly the stub points used to accommodate double-flanged wheels. A project to build working stub points seemed interesting and Derek wanted a scene where, as much as possible, the process of turning slabs of slate into roofing slates could be shown without 'the hand of God' being involved. It therefore also incorporated working wagon turntables and shed doors. The layout appeared in Narrow Gauge and Industrial Railway Modelling Review no.127.

23. Amberley Museum

We welcome back members from this excellent local museum of the industrial heritage in the south-east of England. They will be offering a range of souvenirs and information.

24. Smith & Sons books

David returns to SWING with his range of pre-loved books and photos for the railway enthusiast and modeller.

25. Manor End (Martin Brimson)

[Modelled in O: 1:43.5 scale and 32mm track representing standard gauge 1435mm (4ft $8^{1\!/_2}in)]$

This layout was built to be basically a shunting puzzle. You will see a card displayed for each wagon in the yard; this dictates the train formation to be assembled. The layout is operated from the front so the operator can see the trains and easily speak with viewers, so do ask any questions. A small diesel depot is included to display spare engines. Operation uses Digital Command Control and the use of manual uncoupling is minimised.

26. Cartsdyke Yard (John Purdie)

[Modelled in O: 1:43.5 scale and 32mm track representing standard gauge 1435mm (4ft $8\frac{1}{2}$ in)]

A British Railways shunting yard in the Glasgow area BR set in the early 50s to early 60s period.

27. Kaninchenbau (lain Morrison)

[Modelled in HOe: 1:87 scale and 9mm track representing 760mm (2ft6in) narrow gauge]

A continental narrow gauge layout set in rolling Alpine meadows. It is 100% computer-controlled running multiple trains simultaneously and also has working road vehicles.

28. Golden Arrow Productions

Making their first visit to SWING with their range of simple to build resin loco body kits, including narrow gauge prototypes in 4mm scale.

29. The Worm (lan Corps, Southampton Model Railway Society)

[Modelled in OO-9: 1:76 scale and 9mm track representing 2ft (610mm) narrow gauge]

A layout depicting a narrow gauge line running through a busy town on market day. Lots of small details look out for!

30. Swantons Lock (Ian Corps, Southampton Model Railway Society)

[Modelled in OO: 1:76 scale and 16.5mm track representing standard gauge 1435mm (4ft $8\frac{1}{2}$ in)]

A small scenic shunting layout, developed during lockdown periods, to show what can be achieved in a small space without looking over-crowded.

31. Much Meddling (Chris O'Donoghue)

A narrow gauge layout inspired by the unique work of cartoonist/kinetic sculptor Rowland Emett. It features a magical landscape and a variety of quirky rolling stock.

32. ABC Model Railways

A wide range of modelling items, old and new, in various scales including OO-9 and HOe narrow gauge.

33. Arun Quay (Gordon Gravett)

[Modelled in O: 1:43.5 scale and 32mm track representing standard gauge 1435mm (4ft $8^{1/2} in)]$

Arun Quay represents a small quayside yard on the River Arun, a little upriver from Littlehampton. We operate from the front, so please feel free to ask any questions or generally chat about the layout.
